MEMBER SPOTLIGHT THE DAWSON GROUP

The Dawson Group is a family-owned business, dating back to the founding of Dawson Construction in 1922. Since its inception, Dawson Construction has been involved in many of BC's iconic public infrastructure construction projects, including major projects like the Granville Street Bridge, UBC buildings and portions of the Coquihalla and Yellowhead highways.

Today, the Dawson Group provide highway and civil works construction and maintenance services across BC and Western Canada, with road maintenance contracts in the central Cariboo, the North-Peace and Bulkley-Nass regions of BC.

Ian Dawson, grandson of the original founder, now leads the Dawson Group, which includes Dawson Construction, Dawson Road Maintenance, Eagle Rock Construction, IRL International Trucks, IRL Idealease and DCM Transport. They employ more than 700 people across all their operations, with the corporate group located in Kamloops, BC.

In addition to construction and maintenance services, they also sell, lease and service heavy commercial vehicles, including for the forest industries, as well as working with mining companies in the provision of civil works construction, such as tailings dams.

Dawson Group Chief Operating Officer Yves Lacasse Q&A

How does your organization support road building and/or heavy construction?

Yves: The Dawson Group is an active member of the BC Roadbuilders Association as well as the Southern Interior Construction Association.

We see great value in being part of the organizations, which serve as the voice for our industry. Our team members have been involved with BCRB committees and regularly attend BCRB conferences and meetings to ensure that issues related to construction and maintenance are brought to the attention of government and the public.

We also invest in training for our people, and we are always looking for new technologies to improve the efficiency of our road building and highways maintenance operations.

What current projects do you have underway?


Yves: We just wrapped up significant paving projects around Kamloops and in the central Cariboo. We are currently getting ready for the winter maintenance season

in our four service areas, including by investing heavily in our fleet of equipment. This year, we spent more than \$34 million on new plow trucks, graders and other equipment, and are working to improve yards and depots in all our areas.

The new maintenance contracts specify new standards related to highways and snow clearing. Working to ensure that we meet and exceed those standards is an important goal for our organization.

What is a major accomplishment for your organization?

Yves: This past year, Dawson Road Maintenance successfully acquired new highways maintenance contracts in two new service areas, bringing our total from two areas to four areas. These are 10 to 15-year contracts. The new contracts effectively doubled the size of Dawson Road Maintenance, making the company one of the largest highway maintenance providers in BC.

Yves: The Dawson Group is a family-owned business that prides itself on family values. Our core values — People First, Integrity, Excellence and Respect — emphasize the need to treat our employees, customers and stakeholders as if they were family.

RAIN, SNOW & ICE – OH MY! THE 11TH ANNUAL SHIFT INTO WINTER



As the seasons change, so do driving conditions. October 1st, 2019 marked the first day passenger vehicles driving on designated highways in BC are required to have four matched winter tires, and the official beginning of **Shift Into Winter**, the annual campaign from the Winter Driving Safety Alliance reminding motorists and employers to plan ahead and drive safely in winter conditions.

Winter means different things in different parts of the province. From rain and fog in the south, to snow and ice in the north. Winter conditions – such as colder temperatures, rain, snow, black ice, reduced visibility and fewer daylight hours – can present serious hazards for all drivers, professional and otherwise. The chance of being injured or killed in a motor vehicle crash in British Columbia increases dramatically in winter. **Shift Into Winter** offers helpful tips and information for driving in winter conditions to promote safety on the roads. For those who drive for work, about a third of all work-related crashes resulting in injury and time-loss claims occur in November, December and January.


The launch of **Shift Into Winter 2019** coincided with the law requiring passenger vehicles driving on designated highways in B.C. to have four matched winter tires (three-peaked mountain and snowflake, or mud and snow) with at least 3.5 mm of tread depth starting on October 1, while commercial vehicles must be equipped with chains.

The **Shift into Winter** website provides information for motorists and employers on how to stay safe on the road this winter, whether they are driving for work or pleasure, as well as bite size tips, messages and images that can be shared on social media, blogs and newsletters.

The Winter Driving Safety Alliance offers the following tips for motorists:

- Install a set of four matched winter tires.
- Give your vehicle a pre-season maintenance check-up.
- Keep an emergency kit in your vehicle.
- Conditions change, so be prepared and plan ahead:
 - Check current road and weather conditions on DriveBC.ca – If possible, postpone your plans and avoid driving when road and weather conditions are poor.
 - Plan your route ahead of time Tell someone where you're going and when you expect to arrive and avoid any roads that may become dangerous during bad weather.
 - Slow down The posted speed limit is the maximum speed under ideal driving conditions. If inclement weather hits, slow down and drive with extra care.
 - Maintain a safe following distance Look ahead and keep at least four seconds of distance between you and the vehicle in front.
 - Invest in winter driving training Learn how to brake safely, get out of a skid, and how your car handles in winter weather.

Betty Spalton Recipient Profile: Gabriel Pitman

Gabriel Pitman is currently in his final year of the Construction Electrician program, a four year program that he is completing in his hometown, Penticton, BC.

How did you find out about the Betty Spalton Scholarship?

Gabriel: I found out about the scholarship after a number of web searches, and finally through BCIT's website under "external awards." It's a download-able PDF.

What aspects of road building and heavy construction are you interested in?

Gabriel: All large scale projects are interesting to me, I'd love to participate in as many as I can. It's great to be a part of projects and see them through from beginning to end.

How has the scholarship helped with your education?

Gabriel: The scholarship has meant tuition, and additional certificate training. It's certainly something that helps keep my skills and training up to date.

What was it like to find out you had been awarded this scholarship?

Gabriel: It was a huge sense of accomplishment to receive an award like this, it's a kind of acknowledgement for your effort, one that doesn't come along all that often.

Do you have a favourite BC highway, road or bridge?

Gabriel: Good question, there have been a couple of projects that I would have liked to have worked on. That would have made them favourites for sure. Maybe I'll just give a shout out to the Red Covered bridge outside of Keremeos for the time being, I noticed it has its own stamp now, and it was in a really not so great Nicholas Cage movie that was filmed around the Oliver BC area.

What future career in road building/construction are you pursuing?

Gabriel: I currently have my eye on renewable energy training. It would be great to pair that with some large scale infrastructure projects like a bridge or tunnel project. As far as work goes, I will keep an eye out on what projects are underway or becoming underway in the near future.



Betty Spalton Recipient Profile: LeeAnn Zaitsoff

UBCO student LeeAnn Zaitsoff is in her first year, pursuing a degree in management with an aim to specialize in human resources and arbitration.

How did you find out about the Betty Spalton Scholarship?

I found out about the scholarship through the Stanley Humphries Secondary school scholarship program and the "Grant me" program.

You're in your first year of the Bachelor of Management program at UBCO, what career are you working towards?

After the completion of my degree my goal is to pursue a career in law with hopes of becoming a lawyer.

What aspects of road building and heavy construction are you interested in?

I had the privilege of growing up around heavy equipment and the industry because my dad is an owner of a road building and logging company. Ever since I was young, I've had an interest in running the equipment. As a little girl they were just larger and more exciting versions of toys; however, as I got older I liked how you could start a project/ job in one condition, but with the use of equipment you could turn it into a totally different condition — essentially like an art project.

Running the equipment gave me a sense of empowerment because I was working alongside skilled operators as well as my dad.
